



Home to the 1988 Winter Olympics, Nakiska features some of the best cruising and carving trails in the Rockies. The runs are wide-open, Olympic length and groomed to perfection. Located only an hour from Calgary, Nakiska is considered a favorite by local families. The '88 Olympic legacy of excellence is evident at every turn. Nakiska's state-of-the-art snowmaking and grooming system makes Nakiska western Canada's premier race centre. The 1988 Winter Olympic Games XV marked Canada's debut as the host of this prestigious international event. Heralded at the time as the most successful games ever, Canadians and more specifically Albertans, were eager to show-off their winter paradise to the world.

History: Mount Allan's first claim to fame was in the late 1940's when coal was discovered at the eastern base of the mountain. Close to 40 years later Mount Allan was chosen as the official site for the Olympic Alpine events and in 1986 construction began on what is now known as Nakiska. The Cree word "Nakiska" was chosen to designate the entire recreational ski area and the base lodge. Nakiska, which means "to meet", was an appropriate title, as the world did meet here in February 1988 for the XV Olympic Winter Games. For years to come, people of all ages will continue to meet at Nakiska to downhill ski, cross country ski, hike, or simply experience the magic of this mountain.

Variety of Terrain: The runs here are wide open, smooth and groomed to perfection. The Olympic Legacy of excellence is evident at every turn. Nakiska remains western Canada's premier race centre. State-of-the-art snowmaking and grooming make Nakiska's early season conditions among the most reliable anywhere, essential for training.

A salute to Alberta's Heritage: In recognition of the fact that the province was inhabited for 10,000 years before the arrival of the early explorers, names for expert runs were chosen as a salute to Alberta's first nation people. Nakiska's most challenging runs were named for significant native leaders of the late 19th Century. Skiers will soar down runs such as, **Walking Buffalo**, Alberta's most famous Stoney Chief and leader of the Bearspaw band; cruise down the **Eagle Tail**, a Peigan chief of the last century - Chief Sitting-On-An-Eagle-Tail; and glide down **Powderface**, an run named for a prominent Stoney family.

Location: Just west of Calgary, Alberta, where the first dramatic rise of the Rockies dominates the horizon, is Kananaskis Country. Within these parameters is Canada's Olympic Mountain – Nakiska, host to the 1988 Calgary Winter Olympics. Drive 49 minutes; first west on the Trans Canada Highway, then south on Highway 40.

Climate: Due to the proximity of the resort to Calgary, Nakiska is often greeted with spring Chinooks. These warm weather patterns make Nakiska one of the best locations to enjoy a cool beverage in the late afternoon sun on one of our patio or BBQ areas. Although Nakiska receives less snow by ski area standard than most other areas, the snowmaking system makes enough snow to experience safe, hazard free, skiing conditions early in the year. When the sky's open up in February and March, Nakiska too, can be a powder paradise for those looking for their next fix. Powder hounds should check out upper eagle tail, or the glades on powder days at Nakiska.- Perry Thompson

Enjoy the Legacy: Over two decades ago, Nakiska was rising to host the 1988 Winter Olympics, the original Canadian site for this prestigious international event. The energy and spirit remains at Nakiska through visual landmarks such as the grand Circle of Flags entrance, the nostalgic photos of athletes and historical displays throughout the Daylodge, and even old timing shacks scattered around the mountain. Ski down the same trails that XV Olympic winners such as Alberto Tomba and Vreni Schneider proudly skied – Feel the Legacy!

The Legacy Continues: Nakiska Ski Area was recently named an official Alpine Canada Alpin (ACA) National Training Centre, becoming a key training facility for Canadian athletes such as John Kucera, training for the World Cup season; and the Canadian National Team who will be making Nakiska their home base during the month of February with ongoing training camps. Made famous as the host of the 1998 Winter Olympic Alpine Events, Nakiska has been a popular pre-season training ground for teams from around the world for the past 18 years.

The Best Meeting Place Ever!: The Cree word “Nakiska” means “to meet”, which was an appropriate title since the world did meet here in February 1988 for the XV Olympic Winter Games. With the intention for people of all ages to continue to meet here and ski, cross country ski, hike, or simply experience the magic of this mountain for many years to come; the resort has recently made a number of enhancements at the ski area that will benefit both athlete training and overall guest experience. The long list of improvements includes: widening of runs including the training run Mapmaker, enhanced snowmaking with an overall 40% increase in snowmaking capabilities, full makeovers to the main daylodge, meeting space, and lounge, and last but not least, the new Gold Chair Express that will get skiers and riders to the top of the mountain faster than ever before!
